Prof Ben Colagiuri

Ben Colagiuri works at the University of Sydney, studying how health symptoms can be influenced by expectations. He will share his research on how learning from others can work to our benefit, in the context of pain treatments.

Dr Hemakumar Devan

Hemakumar Devan works in clinical pain management and research, in Aotearoa New Zealand. His work aims to empower people with persistent pain and their whānau (family and significant others). Hem will share his ongoing work with an Indigenous Māori community to co-produce a storybased, whānau-focused, opioid tapering intervention for people with chronic pain.

Lauren Heathcote works at King's College London, on interventions to help cancer survivors rebuild trust in their bodies and support better mental health after cancer treatment. In her talk, Lauren will discuss the process of co-creating a set of short documentary-style films to shape adaptive 'body mindsets' and improve quality of life after childhood cancer, and the potential of this approach to bridge the gap between in-person care and digital healthcare.

Dr Felicity Braithwaite

Felicity Braithwaite is a physiotherapy-trained researcher at the University of Adelaide, Australia. She is passionate about working with people with lived experience to design strategies to improve pain care. Felicity will share her experience creating brief videos alongside people with osteoarthritis to share their stories in ways that inspire other people with osteoarthritis to try evidence-based management strategies.
