RESEARCH PRESENTATIONS

Students, researchers, and professionals at all career levels and from any discipline can submit their research related to neuroethics to be considered for presentation.

We welcome research that addresses any topic or issue related to neuroethics and the ethical, legal, clinical, social, and policy considerations raised by brain sciences and technology. Research may align with the theme.

Authors with an accepted research will be invited to present a poster or give a talk. Presentations may be given in-person at one of the locations, or virtually.

THEME

Building Bridges and Cultivating Community

This interdisciplinary scientific conference celebrates the international neuroethics community and the importance of building connections across distances, disciplines, perspectives, and between people all around the globe.

We will feature discussions of the ethical implications of advancements in brain sciences and technologies, how these developments intersect with the lived experiences of people and their communities, and their potential to impact public discourse and social progress.


